My interest in these issues is informed by a decade-long career in journalism and public affairs. Eight of those years were spent with Singaporean public broadcaster Channel NewsAsia, which is one of the largest English-language news networks in Asia. In my last journalistic role, I ran the broadcaster's Shanghai bureau, where I covered the annual political meetings in Beijing, anti-government protests in Hong Kong in 2019, and Taiwan elections in 2020.
